OUR JOURNEY THROUGH LENT

From the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, Justice, Peace and Human Development

Baptism is a foundational focus of Lent. At the Easter Vigil, the catechumens (referred to as "the elect") will be fully initiated as Catholics through the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.

It is no coincidence that on Easter Sunday, all the baptized will renew our baptismal promises. Note that I said we are going to "renew" our baptismal promises and not merely "repeat" them. "Repeating" simply recalls something that happened in the past. "Renew" is entirely different. "Renewing" our baptismal promises recognizes something that is still foundational in our life.

Renewing our baptismal promises opens our hearts to God's grace. Grace reveals God's great love for us and God's purpose for our life. This great divine love energizes our own love and leads us to a deeper commitment to living these promises more faithfully. Easter is "the" time in the liturgical year for us to remember that we are baptized once for the duration of our lifetime and not merely once in a lifetime. Lent is the time set aside to prepare us to make that renewal faithfully.

Our world, our country, and our Church all need us to rediscover the beauty and power of baptism and our call to be co-redeemers with the Lord Jesus Christ. Our baptism calls us to a life of holiness that reveals Jesus' great and merciful love to all humanity and all creation. Our faith also commits us to restoring the human community and all creation to a life of justice, peace, and solidarity.

As we make the sign of the cross, we remember that we are baptized into the life of the Trinitarian God. We believe in one God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit living a perfect communion of love. Our fidelity to baptism's grace draws us more and more into that divine communion of love. Through the Risen Christ, we become more divine by becoming more the person God created us to be.

Baptism is not only a great gift from God for each of us personally, but a gift to all humanity. We are not baptized only for ourselves. We are baptized for others. In fact, we are baptized for all people. Our baptism commits all of us to help others come to know the great divine love in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Catholic social teaching is at the core of our identity as God's People. The "common good" for all of humanity is a foundational divine law of creation. This law teaches us that God has provided for the basic needs of all humanity without exception. When people are denied their basic human

needs, creation is distorted. We call this distortion "sin". As God's People, we are responsible for restoring creation to its divine intention. We as the baptized have a responsibility for this restoration of the common good.


The Triune God (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit) welcomes and draws us into divine passionate love and perfect communion of life. This communion also unites us to all humanity and creation. Our baptism commits us to sharing this divine love and communion with all. The Season of Lent prepares us to renew our baptismal promises at Easter. The Lenten Season is also a season specifically intended for the catechumens. Now officially designated as The Elect, Lent is their final time of spiritual preparation before entering into the full sacramental life at the Easter Vigil. The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults designates three Scrutiny Rites as a major component of their Lenten journey. During the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent, we celebrate these "scrutinies" for the elect.

What are the "scrutinies?" The RCIA describes them as "rites for self-searching and repentance and above all a spiritual purpose. The scrutinies are meant to uncover, then heal all that is weak, defective, or sinful in the hearts of the elect; to bring out, then strengthen all that is upright, strong, and good. For the scrutinies are celebrated in order to deliver the elect from the power of sin and



HOW ARE WE DOING?

It has now been over six months since my arrival to the Newman Center. I wanted to take a brief moment to reflect and share where we are and how we are doing. But before I begin, I wanted to say that I am still in awe over the dedication and devotion of our parishioners involved in our thriving community. There are so many different activities, events, and opportunities to enrich our faith journey which I am grateful for. I have shared with Fr. Byron that although some days can be very long and demanding, when least expected God gives me that little morsel to keep going. It can be something very simple and sweet, like hearing a child's voice singing the lyrics of a song reminding me why I love being a part of all this.

I realize that there have been changes and adjustments which delayed presenting this Financial Report. But I am very pleased to share with you that we are very sound, stable, and current in regard to our financial situation. It has taken a lot of hours of work between Cristina Oseguera and Denise Burton to bring everything up to date. Both share the responsibilities of our bookkeeping in the office, therefore it is important that you have a vision of how their duties are delegated.

Cristina has been a part of the Newman Center since 2013 and is our Office Manager. She handles all of the scheduling, sacramental documentation, and all parishrelated business. She is also in charge of our Accounts Receivable. Cristina is the person you would contact if you wish to make a financial contribution or have a question regarding a donation. Basically, she is responsible for all of the income of the Newman Center.

Denise joined the Newman Center at the end of October 2022 and was only part-time until recently. She has been very patient and accommodating through the delays in the transition to her full-time position as Bookkeeper / Facilities Manager. Denise comes with over 18 years of professional experience in accounting and office management after working for two different companies which operate in commercial property management and construction. Denise has a broad knowledge and understanding of maintenance, repairs, renovation, and construction which is a perfect fit for the Newman Center.

Both Cristina and Denise have been working together and are in constant contact with the Diocesan accounting office in order to assure that everything is in order and we remain on track. I am grateful for all the hard work and time they give and special thanks to the Diocese for being so readily available in their support and consultations.

The Financial Report presented here shows February 2023 with a comparison to one year ago, February 2022. Although our Sunday Collections have been slightly lower there are some contributing factors to consider. At the end of 2021 the Newman Center was immersed in the "Heart to Heart" Commitment Campaign which was generating additional revenue for the parish. Then as you look at 2023, you can see that donations were given to other areas within the parish. World Youth Day fundraising is at full force generating close to \$18,000 from donations. By the end of February 2023, there is an increase of almost \$14,000 in comparison to 2022.

As we look at our expenditures for payroll 2023 has an 8.5% increase which is expected due to the raising cost of benefits. But we were able to lower our Administrative costs by 6%. The bottom line for 2023 is that we have an increase in funds of over \$15,000.

For our next report we will try to have available a broader comparison using a YTD (year to date) comparison against last year's totals.

In closing, it is important to acknowledge that none of this would be possible without the continued support of our devoted parishioners and our dedicated staff. I would also like to thank our Finance Council and the tremendous encouragement and support that they have given us. 
