Welcome students, parents, and all Newmanites!

I hope you have met a friendly face today and feel the community's welcome. We have been excited to get this school year started. We're happy you're here!

I often say how I wish everyone could see and experience the student and young adult gatherings and the community they find here. Allow me to give some details about two of our gatherings.

Wednesday Student Dinners

These dinners take place Wednesday evenings and have been the staple of our campus ministry for longer than I've been alive. Free food always works! We begin the evening by welcoming new and returning students and a few moments to check in with one another. Our prayer program alternates between Mass and introducing one of our many prayer traditions. We hope to expose the students to a different prayer practice that perhaps they have never experienced. We want to convey the message that there is more than one way to experience God in our lives. We're not all just spiritual practices, we do trivia and games as well. The winning team gets a prize! Dinner is our informal gathering where students come and go however they please. The meal is the opportunity for them to just be; no expectations, no requirements. Jesus calls us as we are.

A community like this can be a safe place they may need to find a community where meaningful relationships can come about. Pope Francis, by word and example, has called us to "meet people where they are." (2021, Message for the 55th World Communications Day). These young people connect and accompany one another when given the chance to experience healthy relationships.

Young Adult Mass

Our Sunday 7:00pm Mass is a great example of making space for young people to lead. This Mass, to which all are invited, serves as the liturgical safe space for young people to get their hands dirty and experience serving in various roles. For many, it is their first time even considering becoming involved in such a way. These opportunities are enhanced when young people see other young people taking a chance and being accepted.

In the seats, young people are more visible to one another which in turn provides another opportunity for them to feel comfortable. When you feel comfortable you can begin to trust, critically think, to ask questions. Without an aggressive approach or a critical voice, the young people are more open to our Newman community, but more importantly to Jesus' message.

These two examples are our most visible ministries to students. Much more experiences take place one-on-one with the campus ministry team, and peer-to-peer, on and off the Newman Center campus.

So please join me this weekend, and throughout the year, in creating this community for others to discover. Join me in living the Gospel through our lives!

A View from the Pew

"It is only with the heart that one can see rightly...." The Little Prince.

Ironically, it is the ministry that has most influenced my relationship with God that now in my latter years I spent very little time engaged in. Perhaps it is because others have always seen me as "an English teacher" and assigned me the role of lector. And it is not that I do not love to read the beautiful words of scripture; it is only because since I was a child, I always found the truest voice of God reflected in music, which remains where my heart truly sees Him (and hears Him.)

To read the Word of God is like reading to my children when they were little or reading poetry to my classes at the high school. The rhythm and cadence captures my imagination first, followed by the imagery, the symbolism and the metaphor. This all engages my mind in the delivery of the Word and propels me back to my speech and drama days of high school. However comfortable this may be, it does not propel my soul into Paradise as music does. I was introduced to the piano in first grade and by junior high was singing and playing the flute. By high school, I was playing the organ for church, cantoring, and singing in both the school and church choir, yet it was not until I came to California at 22 that I became intensely immersed in this ministry. By age 25, I had joined the choir in Three Rivers, CA and learned how to play and improvise with chords thanks to Bruce Huddleston of the High Sierra jazz band. That choir became my family, and I often spent weekends at the director's lodge and St Anthony's Retreat House, working on piano music and learning harmony for both Sunday Mass and Retreat Mass. Those were golden years for me that lasted until my early 30's. I resumed participation in this ministry at St Joseph Church in Los Banos, but it was not until my children were old enough to participate in Children's Choir that I became once again totally immersed in the ministry. I played and sang for both English and Spanish Masses and even helped to begin a Children's Choir that lasted for a couple years. Misfortune struck, and I had to devote myself to my children's health and teaching school which left little time for music anymore. I still sat at the piano and did praise and worship, however, and during the Pandemic, it was the way I stayed connected to my students, creating a YouTube Channel, taking song requests, and figuring out the chording in order to play their favorite requests. Recently, I was able to sing with the choir for the Chrism Mass at Holy Spirit. I experienced God's voice so strongly at that Mass that my entire Lent was graced beyond measure.

I have not even sat at the piano for several months, but still my favorite part is Mass remains singing and listening to the Response, no matter where I attend Mass. It is a matter of God speaking to my heart, and my heart remaining open to hearing His never ending song of love in every note and all the silence in between. As the second half of the above quote from The Little Prince reminds us, "...what is essential is invisible to the eye."

In the Gospel someone asks Jesus basically the same question: "Lord, will only a few people be saved? And Jesus does not say yes or no. He answers in his particular way: "Strive to enter through the narrow gate"

The question will, then, be: what is this narrow gate?

I'm not sure, but something in me tells that that gate is Jesus himself.

He is the gate not only to salvation after this life, but salvation in the here and now. We enter through the narrow gate every time we emulate Jesus and strive to reflect his dream for humanity through our lives as if we were mirrors. We enter through the narrow gate when we choose unity over division. We enter through the narrow gate when at night we are tired but say a prayer. We enter through the narrow gate through the sacraments, especially the Eucharist, which is the source and summit of our faith.

This certainly takes energy, time and determination. This is what the saints did; this is what Jesus did... we have seen this is possible and never in vain! Let's strive to enter through the narrow gate even if it hurts... it's totally worth it in this life and the next!

Just Because You're a Jew Doesn't Mean ...


This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Isaiah 66:18-21 Gathering of the nations
- ► Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13 The discipline of god
- ► Luke 13:22-30 The narrow door

The Gospel reading reaffirms the theme of the first reading, promising that people throughout the world, not just Jews, will be welcomed into God's Kingdom. This proclamation would have been shocking to some Jews at the time of Isaiah's prophecy, as well as in Jesus' time. For all of Jewish history up until Jesus (and well beyond), Jews were proud to think of themselves as "the chosen people." Many of the Old Testament laws aimed at establishing and ensuring a separation between their holiness and the "impurities" of the rest of the world. Isaiah and Jesus turn this understanding upside-down, declaring that God's invitation is to all people, not only a select few.

Throughout all of history, in many world religions, there have been people who have been obsessed with the question of who will be saved and/or how many people will be saved. The anonymous person who asked Jesus "Lord, will only a few people be saved?" seems to be in this category. The question may come from a place of genuine concern, as in "I want to be with my loved ones for all eternity." Or it may come from a place of self-concern, much like a child who wants assurance that he will be rewarded from his parents for his good behavior while his brother is punished for his bad behavior.

Jesus refuses to make any promises to those who are trying to earn a place in heaven. His response, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate..." points the



questioner back to himself, as if to say "The others are none of your business; worry about yourself." He goes on to warn that being close to him physically, being related to him as a Jew, or being in a highly regarded social position won't guarantee an entry into the Kingdom of God. Like many of his parables, Jesus turns the conventional thinking of the day upside-down, suggesting that there are many whom society considers unworthy or outcasts who are welcomed and cherished by God. "Some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last."
