Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C August 7, 2022 Readings: Wis 18:6-9; Heb 11:1-2, 8-19; Lk 12:32-48

Jesus said to his disciples: "...Blessed are those servants whom the master finds vigilant on his arrival... You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come." Luke 12:37a, 40

This week's reading has a familiar and recurring theme that we find in all three synoptic Gospels. We are reminded to always "being vigilant" by staying attentive... with anticipation... while preparing "in hope" that someday we will be united with Christ when he comes again. All of this can seem daunting at times, but since none of us know the "time or place" of Christ's second coming, we must remain alert and ready. What does that really mean for us? And better yet, how will we know if we are properly prepared? Well, nobody can really know the answer to that question, but we are taught that being united with Christ when He returns is contingent upon our fidelity, reliance and obedience to God. In other words, be willing to place God first and foremost in our lives, our thoughts, and our actions as we interact with others and the world around us.

There is a Greek term "Parousia" found in the New Testament used to refer to Christ's second coming. Its original translation implied or signified an... "arrival", "coming", or "presence". I know we have all, at one time or another, prepared for the coming of a guest or an event. There seems to be so much to do and sometimes it is never enough. We feel rushed, pressured and unorganized almost to the point of exhaustion and at times we can't even enjoy what should be a joyful and celebrated moment. Sometimes this is what ministry can feel like. There is a lot of planning and preparing that happens before anything can take place at any parish. Sometimes it is amazing that things go as smoothly as they do. And there are times the planners are the only ones that know there was a "glitch" or "mishap" in the process. Needless to say, none of this can take place without volunteers that assist and step up to help. Volunteers are an invaluable treasure that are essential in working together in the Church's mission. We would be at a loss without them. But why do we do it? Why add more work for an already busy life? I have to trust and believe it comes back to our ideology of the hope when Jesus returns, we will be "prepared" and "ready".

There is a secular exercise that has become quite common, called "mindfulness". Although its roots and practices are found and used by many non-Christian religions, it general premise has great value in nurturing our faith and Christian virtues, ultimately fostering our relationship with God and others. As I was reading different commentaries on this week's Gospel Reading, I found one article in particular that suggested visualizing yourself with Jesus. As I read further, it posed some questions such as... if Jesus were alive and "present with you", how would you be spending your time? Wow, what a thought! Okay, I don't think that I would sit around and waste time watching television with Him. And, without a doubt, I wouldn't take Him shopping. But, most definitely, I would prepare a meal, eat and spend as much time as I could talking with Him and asking questions. If each of us were to examine and evaluate our day to day activities through that lens, of Jesus being alive and "present with us", then we most certainly would plan everything quite differently. Now, I have to clarify what is wrong with that statement... because Jesus "is present" with us... in the Eucharist and remembering that Jesus is both divine and human, therefore Jesus being God, He is present with us always!

So, let's go back to mindfulness, if we begin to live with an awareness that Jesus is present always, hopefully it will guide us in being prepared and alert. *"Christians who practice mindfulness engage in this process with an awareness that God's presence is part of what is present in the moment, acknowledging that all we observe in each moment is given by God."* (Dr

Although I have revisited these Readings so many times, this week it gave me a lot to reflect on and reminded me to allow room for the "presence" of Christ in my life every day. If not, I am alone on my journey and it can become very daunting and lonely. There is one last item that I wanted to share with you was this image of a coffee mug which brought me a smile and laughter. It also reminded me that I would also want to spend time with Jesus laughing, because I imagine Him wanting to laugh with us also!

Have a wonderful week as you welcome Jesus to be present in your life.

From Fr. Byron Macias, CMF

As I am typing this, we are literally flying from New York to Miami. I am accompanying the Claret Movie people: Pablo, the movie director, and Lucia, the movie producer and distributor. These people book about 10 interviews a day. Yesterday the last two interviews were at Radio Maria in New York; then, we had to set up for a satellite interview with EWTN.

Toward the end of the day, tired, hungry and sticky because of the humidity, we rode the train home. Both Lucia and Pablo pulled out their respective children's pictures on their phones and gazed into them. Their children are away, at home, in Spain.

I looked at Pablo y Lucia getting lost in their children's pictures. Their eyes lighted up and a smile came into their lips. For the seconds they gazed into the pictures, I am pretty sure they were at home.

I asked them: What's the most important thing that you have? You can infer their answer...

In the Gospel this weekend Jesus says: "Where your treasure is there also will your heart be" We have heard this so many times in our lives (or at least once a year on a Sunday Mass) and at face value it is a good indicator of where our hearts should be: in the life-giving, meaningful and liberating things in life.

Yet, I believe Jesus is also inviting us to think about what God's treasure is. I'm pretty sure if God had a cellphone, God would pull out your picture and smile and his eyes would light up just like Lucia's and Pablo's. Not many people have played all the cards for you; but God has! God has wanted to be with us and among us because we are that important to God... we are his treasure.

Let this news, this Good News, warm your heart during cold moments; let this good news fill your existence, your good fights and efforts with purpose; and let this good news inspire you to live in such a way that your words and actions can remind others that they too, are God's treasures.

They also need funds to: 1) provide freshwater wells, and education in rural communities of Chad, Malawi, South Sudan, Kenya and Nigeria; 2) Sponsoring seminarians, our future priests; 3) Supporting priests in the founding / building of new churches. Your support to this worthy cause will be an immense encouragement to the Missionary Society of St. Paul to as they continue to take the good news to those desperately in need of it. Bad or Good News?

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Wisdom 18:6-9 On the death of the Egyptian firstborn
- ▶ Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19 or 11:1-2, 8-12 Faith of Abraham
- ► Luke 12:32-48 or 12:35-40 Depend on God, not possessions

Luke's Gospel, more than any others, has an emphasis on money, possessions, and wealth. Luke includes parables about riches (such as last week's parable about the rich man who built bigger barns) that are not found in Matthew, Mark, or John. The Gospel also states several times that Jesus directed his disciples to go out and continue his ministry without taking any personal belongings along with them.

It's a challenge that is hard for most of us to hear, and we can quickly go to rationalizations about why we may not be called to do the same thing. Of course it would have been just as hard for Jesus' disciples to hear too. But instead of reacting to what sounds like bad news to us ("sell your belongings and give alms") can we instead listen for the good news in the directive? After all, Jesus didn't come to make our lives more difficult, or impoverished. He said that he came so that we may have life, and have life in it's fullness. So if he is asking us to sell our possessions, he must have good reason.

The good news is that in letting go of physical possessions, we get an "inexhaustible treasure" in return that no thief can

reach, nor corruption can touch. "Where your treasure is, there also will your heart be." When we come to our last moments on this earth, where do we want our treasure to be? In our material belongings? Or

Sheepish Question:
