The Deacon's Speakin'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

There is a kind of traditional fascination with Lent that doesn't seem to be limited to those who fervently practice their faith. Great numbers of us make great effort to receive the ashes, give up something we enjoy, get to church more often, or give to the poor during these special forty days. Just like the "spring cleaning" we do at home or work, Lent is our time for getting things in order so that we receive new life. Lent is a time for spring spiritual housecleaning. However good this discipline of Lenten practice might help us feel about ourselves, mere discipline is not the aim of Lent. However much we do, the only value in these practices is if they ultimately lead to renewed life.


Ash Wednesday is neither a Sunday or a holy day of obligation, yet our churches are packed. We want to be marked with ashes that come from dead palm branches that have been burned. It seems a contradiction – we use this sign of death at the beginning of Lent to mark our journey to a renewed life.

Penitential practices in themselves don't guarantee a spiritual renewal. Too often we spend too much of life going through the motions of what we're required to do. Spiritual housecleaning requires more. It requires a great deal of awareness of what we want to turn away from – sinfulness – and whom we wish to turn to – God – who gives us life. Although all of us are called to perform penance throughout the year, Lent is a special time the Church gives us to concentrate and focus on ourselves – not just on penance, but on the whole process of conversion – transformation to new life.

Well, most people who've had some life experience under their belts realize that human experience is full of risks, and full of trade-offs, and that life is full of good and bad, happy and sad. Having the good things in life doesn't come without a cost. There's always some sacrifice, some hard work! And, of course, life and death are part of the cycle of our human existence.

The Gospel suggests the three traditional facets of Christian penance: charity (or almsgiving), prayer, and fasting. The most genuine penance incorporates all three, because each of these practices is directed to setting right our relationship with God, self, and others. Each of these three practices takes us outside and beyond ourselves, toward others through charity, toward God through prayer, toward ourselves through fasting.

Jesus emphasized that our Lenten penance need not be large and showy, in fact, it's better to practice those things which can be reasonably accomplished and, at the same time, "stretch" us a little beyond ourselves. Penance is necessary to change us and to redirect us toward God and God's love. And, by changing ourselves, we change our relationship to God and each other. The peace, joy, and freedom of the relationship come with the living out of the relationship. God never abandons us.

The readings of Ash Wednesday cautioned us to make our Lenten penance more than mere practices. It's much better to do a little well than to take on a whole lot and, in the end, not have deepened and improved our relationships with God and others. And Lent isn't an endurance contest either. The question we might ask ourselves on Holy Saturday as we prepare to celebrate the Easter mystery ought not be whether we succeeded in not eating our favorite junk food or in our effort to get to Mass every day (as admirable as these sacrifices might be), but whether we have begun to turn our lives around in a new, life giving way.

Our dying to self during Lent is about beginnings – coming to new life, deepening our relationship with God and others, and transforming who we are and how we love.

Weekly Justice Challenge

We are entering the first full week of our Lenten journey—a journey to the cross and then to resurrection. We know we can't go straight to resurrection. As with Jesus, the sacrifice of the cross is a necessary part of our journey. Your challenge this week, but really for all of Lent, is to think of someone in the world who is experiencing the weight of their own cross. It might be the cross of hunger, of human trafficking, of living in a war-torn village or city, or of being denied freedom of expression. Even though you don't know this person's name, imagine how this person looks, how old they might be, and even where they live. Then choose something to give up this Lent, something which may cause a bit of suffering and sacrifice on your part, to stand in solidarity with the brother or sister whose pain is—and should be—our pain. Offer up your sacrifice on their behalf. Every day, as members of our one human family, say a prayer for this person. Use the time or the money you would have spent on whatever you give up to support an organization in your parish or in our universal Catholic Church which works to end injustice for those who suffer. Some possible choices include your local St. Vincent de Paul chapter, the Catholic Campaign for Human Development, Catholic Charities, or Catholic Relief Services.

Stay Strong

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Genesis 9:8-15 Covenant with Noah
- ▶ 1 Peter 3:18-22 The purpose of Christ's suffering
- ► Mark 1:12-15 Jesus' temptation; the call to conversion

This is the first Sunday of Lent, and we have 40 days stretching ahead of us before Easter. Maybe by now you have settled on some sort of Lenten commitment for the next six weeks. We often think about Lent as a time to give up a bad habit or something that we know isn't good for us, such as coffee, sweets, or alcohol. Traditionally, Catholics are encouraged to commit to something in three areas: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving (giving to the poor).

We are encouraged to strengthen our prayer lives. If we have a prayer practice, maybe we can add a little time to it or add in something extra. If we haven't been good at making regular time for prayer, Lent can be the push we need to get a regular practice started. It could be as simple as following a Lenten prayer booklet or online daily retreat program, or getting up a few minutes early to pray and journal.





"I will recall the covenant I have made between me and you and all living beings."

Sheepish Question:

How do I respond to God's loving promise of salvation?

Also, we are called to fast from something that is unloving, unproductive, or just not good for us and the world community. That might mean fasting from gossip. It could mean fasting from social media that keeps us from connecting in-person in our daily lives. Or maybe it is fasting from buying things we don't need. Finally, with almsgiving, we are called to share our resources with the poor. It is exciting to think of all the good that can come from Lent if we can stick to our promises, and many other people do the same.

Of course there will be temptations. Satan, who tempted Jesus in the desert, doesn't want us to stay faithful to our commitments either, because he knows how much good we can do.

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
