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The Epiphany of the Lord, Year C January 2, 2021 Readings: Is 60:1-6; Eph 3:2-3a, 5-6; Mt 2:1-12

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The Feast of the Epiphany is one of the church's oldest feasts. For Westerners, the Epiphany may be only the twelfth day of Christmas; but the feast is older than the feast of Christmas. In the East, this was, in fact, the original feast of Christmas. The East still celebrates the manifestation of God to the world in Christ, as well as his manifestation at his baptism, and during the wedding feast of Cana. Among Hispanics and the people of Northwestern Europe, Epiphany is commonly known as the Feast of the Three Kings, celebrated in various cultural and family rituals.

The Feast of the Epiphany enjoys greater solemnity in the East than it does in the West. The East follows the Scriptures by not identifying the number of visitors or by calling them Melchior, Caspar, and Balthasar, the names given to the magi in the religious folklore of the West. In fact, the olivewood creches that can be bought in the Holy Land today generally include four, not three, wise men from the East.

With the celebration of the Feast of the Epiphany on the first Sunday of the year, rather than on January 6, the traditional day for its celebration, we have an opportunity to speak about the universal gift of salvation. Christians tend to see themselves as the privileged recipients of the promise of salvation, but today's second reading reminds us that with regard to salvation we Gentiles are coheirs with Jews. We are also reminded that God wills the salvation of all human beings (1 Tim 2:5–6). This is something we must all remember, especially in these days of suspicion of and hostility to Muslims and other religious minorities. For the most part, we're ignorant with regard to Buddhists, Hindus, and the millions of other people of good will who have no firsthand experience of the gospel of Jesus Christ. Only at the Parousia (the Christian and Islamic belief that Jesus will return again) will all of us begin to understand fully what it means for Jesus to be the one advocate between God and humankind. Only then will everyone come to realize that God wills the salvation of everyone. Perhaps, we will come to understand that He is able to manifest his saving power even through religions other than our own.

This is the word: ἐπιφάνεια - That is the Greek word for "Epiphany," which means "appearance" or "manifestation." This is the word that refers to the manifestation of Jesus to the world; and, again, it comes down to God's initiative to dwell among us.

We are the Three Wise Men (and Women) to whom, although we live on the other side of the world, Jesus wants to manifest not only himself but also the real tidings of joy that his Good News is about: "that the Gentiles [that is: you and I] are co-heirs, members of the same body, and co-partners in the promise in Christ Jesus through the gospel." (Today's Second Reading: Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6).

And now the hard part of this: How can we be an epiphany of God's love and promises to others? It's certainly not easy but we can at least try; then miracles happen!

Baby Jesus Meets the Public

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Isaiah 60:1-6 Glory of the new Zion
- ► Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6 Commission to preach God's plan
- ▶ Matthew 2:1-12 The visit of the magi

In the ancient world, an epiphany referred to the appearance of a god among humans. For the church, the Feast of the Epiphany celebrates the public recognition of Jesus by the outside world when the magi found the newborn in Bethlehem. The connection between the first reading from Isaiah and the Gospel could not be more clear. Matthew picks up on Isaiah's prophecy of a guiding light (the star), travelers coming from afar (the magi), and extravagant gifts (gold and frankincense) to show that Jesus is the promised savior.

Over the centuries, many legends have told of the magi who followed the star to discover Jesus. All scripture tells us about their identity, however, is that they were "from the east," which Matthew's readers would have known meant that they were Gentiles—not Jews. This was significant because Matthew was writing for a primarily Jewish audience, trying to convince them that Jesus was their long-awaited savior. At the same time, Matthew wanted his readers to hear that people *outside* of their religion also recognized this baby as worthy of their homage.

In effect, Matthew is telling them that Jesus came for anyone and everyone, regardless of where they come from or what their religious background is.

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Epiphany, the public "coming out" of Jesus to the wider



world. Although Jesus was born into a specific religion and culture in a particular time in history, the Epiphany reminds us that he is not limited to being a savior to the Jewish people. He is available to everyone, as Mary demonstrated by welcoming the foreign travelers "from the east."

Questions of the Week

In some cultures, the Feast of the Epiphany is celebrated more than Christmas. Does your family have any Epiphany traditions? What would be an appropriate way to celebrate?

> Were you taught that salvation is limited to a set population of chosen people, or did you grow up with the belief that Jesus came for all people, regardless of their religion? How did that affect how you related to others outside of your church?

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
