

THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

A really good listener, a really good counselor, a really close friend all have at least one thing in common. They quietly take in words, body language, eye movement, and then respond accordingly. They read people and situations quickly and accurately. Being in a conversation with those who are glancing at their cell phone every other second sends an important message to us. They are not giving full attention to the conversation and the phone is more important than the conversation. Even worse, the phone is more important than we are. This type of situation usually draws a rather negative response from us. We might roll our eyes, stop the conversation, or even walk away from the phone-bound person.

Interaction and responses are part of our everyday living. Often they are inconsequential. Sometimes, however, interaction and response have long lasting consequences. This Sunday's gospel is about Jesus' disciples "reading" people and responses. The interaction-response has long-lasting and lifechanging consequences.

When Jesus sends disciples forth as "laborers for His harvest" He predicts two responses to their presence. Either disciples will be welcomed and able to minister fruitfully or they will be rejected and their ministry becomes judgement against the unwelcoming town. In either case, however, the "kingdom of God is at hand". How so? Whether accepted or rejected, disciples "harvest" the "kingdom of God" by their very response, by their very proclamation of Jesus' name, by their very faithfulness to Jesus' mission. No wonder disciples rejoice.

Their rejoicing is an acknowledgement that God is present and working through them. The kingdom of God is present in the very persons of those who take up Jesus' invitation to be laborers in bringing about an abundant harvest.

Flu Guidelines

Suggested Guidelines during the Flu / Cold Season:

- Do Not come to Mass if you have flu like symptoms.
- Do Not bring children to Mass that have flu like symptoms or are ill.
- Do Not receive from the Chalice or shake hands with others if you have a scratchy throat, sniffles, coughing or sneezing.
- Do Not touch your face or mouth without first washing your hands
- Wash your hands good with hot water and soap before and after Mass.
- When you can't wash your hands, use a hand sanitizer with at least 62% alcohol.
- Get your flu shot, get plenty of rest, eat a balanced diet, drink water and exercise.

Use these guidelines for all events of your daily living and be well.

One of my favorite Bible Passages comes from Isaiah 49:16: "See, I have written your name on the palms of my hands." Whenever I struggle with something or doubt myself, I find this passage very comforting because it gives me a sense of connection, belonging and accompaniment: we are not accidents of nature but children wanted, loved, respected and empowered by God.


Needed: More than 12

This Week's Readings at Mass


- ► Isaiah 66:10-14c Mother Zion
- ► Galatians 6:14-18 The Cross, our true boast
- ► Luke 10:1-12, 17-20 or 10:1-9 Mission of the 72

Twice in the Gospel of Luke Jesus sends disciples out to spread his mission by curing the sick and preaching the Kingdom of God, a realm of peace, justice, and compassion for all. The first time, in the chapter before this reading, Jesus sent out his 12 apostles. In the passage today, he sends out a larger group of 72 others. It seems Jesus realizes that he needs more than 12 helpers in this work!

It's likely that this larger group of 72 included women as well as men. In chapter 8, Luke mentions by name several women who accompanied Jesus in his ministry including Mary Magdalen, Joanna, and Susanna, "and many others, who provided for them out of their resources" (Lk 8:2-3). When Jesus sends out the 72 they are sent out in pairs. In the Acts of the Apostles and Paul's letters, there are references to married couples who work and travel together as missionaries.
