7. WITH THE OTHER CHRISTIAN CONFESSIONS

The dialogue between Christians of different confessions, united by one Baptism, has a special place in the synodal journey.

- b. What areas do they concern?
- c. What fruits have we drawn from this "journeying together"?
- d. What are the difficulties?

8. AUTHORITY AND PARTICIPATION

A synodal Church is a listening Church that provides opportunities to listen to the Holy Spirit and People of God to discern together and walk forward on a common path.

a. How does your parish identify the goals to be pursued, the way to achieve them and the steps to be taken?

b. How are the practices of teamwork, co-responsibility, and lay ministries promoted in your parish?

9. DISCERNING AND DECIDING

In a synodal style, decisions are made through discernment, based on a consensus that flows from the common obedience to the Holy Spirit.

- a. By what procedures and methods do we discern together and make decisions? b. How can they be improved?

Creation Care Tips

"On the day after the Passover, on that very day, they ate the produce of the land, unleavened cakes and parched grain. The manna ceased on the day they ate the produce of the land, and the Israelites no longer had manna; they ate the crops of the land of Canaan that year." — Joshua 5:11-12 Once the ancient Israelites were a free people in their own land, they could feed themselves from what they grew. This week, like the Israelites, consider where your food comes from. Do you buy produce shipped from thousands of miles away when there are farmer's markets within a few miles of you? Has it traveled long distances to be processed and packaged? Make a commitment to switch your buying power to more local, in-season foods so as to support the farmers in your region, even if you start small, like giving up bananas shipped from South America if you can get other locally grown fruit now.

Weekly Justice Challenge

Justice Challenge: Sometime we become so enamored with the Parable of the Prodigal Son that we forget the interaction that prompted its telling. Jesus told the iconic parable in response to being criticized by the Pharisees and scribes for welcoming and eating with sinners. Who is welcome in your home? With whom are you willing to dine? The challenge this week is to spend some leisure time with someone who has made some serious mistakes and may even have a bad reputation. Can you offer the compassionate presence of Christ to this person and discern the goodness that lies beneath the surface of this person's life?

They Don't Get It

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a Samuel anoints David
- ► Ephesians 5:8-14 Duty to live in the light
- ► John 9:1-41 The man born blind

In some ways, Jesus' entire ministry was about bringing light into darkness and opening the eyes of the blind. He brought good news to the poor ("God knows your every need and will provide for you"). He proclaimed release to captives ("You did nothing to deserve your illness, leprosy, or disability and I am not afraid to touch you. I want you to be welcomed back into the community.") He let the oppressed go free ("As a foreigner, a member of a different religion, a woman, or a widow I am on your side - I don't condone how others exploit you or treat you unfairly.") In his teaching and his preaching, he conveyed that

God wants people to have what they need to live lives of joy, health, meaning, and fullness.

For some people who lived in fear of a vengeful God who was always ready to punish their shortcomings, that was enlightening. God loves us freely and beyond our imag-

ining. There is nothing we can do to earn or to lose that love. For others who thought highly of themselves while judging others as less-than, like the Pharisees in today's reading, Jesus' teachings were offensive. They thought they understood the way God works. They thought they had all the answers. They were so sure they could see ("If he's blind, it means he or

his parents sinned") that they weren't open to a

new way of understanding God. When confronted with Jesus' healing actions, they shut down and refused to accept what was good. (Why insist on arguing about the healer's identity instead of rejoicing that a blind man can now see?) On the other hand, the man born blind was humble enough to admit he didn't understand how God works, but was open to accepting Jesus as the God-sent healer he was.
