THE DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

Pentecost celebrates the power of the Holy Spirit energizing Christians for a mission to change the world into the kingdom of God. But, it's a mission which many view with apathy, if it's even considered at all. We barely have enough time to take care of responsibilities in our own backyards, much less take on a commitment to the "world." And as much as we'd like to show our Christian goodwill to others, we often feel helpless to effect change. It's wonderful to have pious ambitions to make our world a better place, but where do we get the power to do so?

This is the predicament that faces the apostles in today's Gospel. They're depressed and afraid and find themselves in limbo not knowing for what or why. Hiding behind locked doors, they talk and discuss recent events, but feel handicapped by their powerlessness. But then something happened. There's no question that on Pentecost they underwent a profound transformation. They got their collective acts together, so to speak, and charged out to spread the good news about Christ and His message.

We might wonder what really happened in that locked room to transform them. What "psyched" them and shifted their powerlessness to passionate energy? The readings from Acts and the Gospel simply say that the Spirit came upon them. But what does that mean? We may say they received a special grace from God, but how does the Spirit work? Is it possible for us to get that Spirit for ourselves?

If we look closely, what happened becomes apparent. The apostles stayed together as a group. They faced up to their inadequacies and their inability to go it alone. Putting their trust in God and in one another, they began to pull together again, united in their love of Jesus and His mission. They faced up to their responsibilities and experienced mutual support in a common cause. And it happened — they got Spirit! Every day we can see how this Spirit works. There's no secret about this "power;" it's the power of people being attentive, caring, and supportive of one another in a common effort.

In the Acts of the Apostles, the apostles left the safety of the upper room to proclaim the Good News. They did exactly what Jesus did before He was put to death. They risked their lives for the Kingdom of God. They gave up their safe place for the safety of the Kingdom.

It's easy to stay in a safe place. It's easy to hold on to our comfort level, but Christ continually calls us out of the "upper rooms" of our lives. He continually calls us to embrace the challenge of the Gospel. He calls us to be different, to be holy. He calls us to embrace virtue! He calls us to many insecurities.

I don't know who's credited with the quote, "If you want to give God a good laugh, tell Him your plans." That's because God has plans for each of us beyond our imaginations, plans, ways that we can bring love to others.


From Babbling to Fluency

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ► Acts 2:1-11 Descent of the Holy Spirit
- ▶ 1 Corinthians 12:3b-7, 12-13 Many gifts, one Spirit
- ▶ John 20:19-23 Jesus gives the Holy Spirit to the disciples

In the first reading today, Luke tells us that the Spirit came upon the disciples dramatically and gave them the gift of tongues—the ability to communicate with foreign visitors who were from all over the known world. It is a scene that is almost an exact reversal of the story of the Tower of Babel found in Genesis. In that story, everyone in the whole world spoke the same language. In their selfish pride, they came together to build a city and a tower to reach to heaven to "make a name for ourselves." God humbled them by confusing their language so they could no longer understand one another. Their speaking sounded like nothing more than "babbling," and for that reason, their city became known as Babel. With the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, the scattering of people and confusion of languages is overcome by the Spirit so that everyone can hear and understand "the mighty acts of God."

In the second reading, St. Paul explains his understanding of how the Holy Spirit works by comparing it to our physical bodies. We all understand that our different body parts have different functions and that all are needed for our health and well-being. St. Paul taught that the Holy Spirit can be understood to work among us in the same way. As individuals, we have all been given certain spiritual gifts that the world needs and which

can benefit everyone. The source of all those different gifts is the one Holy Spirit.

In the Gospel reading, we hear John's account of how Jesus gave the gift of the Holy Spirit to his disciples: he breathed on them. That image would have reminded them, and their fellow Jews, of the story of creation when God made Adam out of the dust of the earth and breathed into him, bringing him to life. In one way, when Jesus breathed on the disciples, he was bringing them to life in a new way. Now, instead

> of being huddled behind locked doors because they were afraid, they are given the courage and strength to go out and spread the Good News with all those who hadn't yet heard of Jesus and his message of love.


