Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C October 2, 2022 Readings: Hab 1:2-3; 2:2-4; 2 Tm 1:6-8, 13-14; Lk 17:5-10

In recent Sundays the liturgical texts, especially the Gospel of Luke, have been hammering away at the question of the place of money in the life of a disciple of Jesus. Last Sunday we heard that money is an obstacle to faith, to faithful trust in the care and power of our God. Today we pick up this theme of faith. Today's readings tell us what trust is all about, what faith in God means for us.

Habakkuk is lamenting the state of the world in which he lives. The cry of the prophet is so contemporary: "I cry out to you, 'Violence!' but you do not intervene." How many of us are crying out in the face of the violence that surrounds us --locally, nationally, internationally! How many of us are questioning, as Habakkuk did, why God does not intervene to do something about the disastrous conditions of the world and the continuing decline of our civilization.

October is "Respect for Life" month, and we cannot help but mourn for all who are killed, from the womb to elder abuse, from drive-by shootings to the death penalty. We destroy the earth and its atmosphere, we uproot and abandon its peoples. The scope of iniquity, even within ourselves, dwarfs goodness. Habakkuk could be writing today: "Why do you let me see ruin; why must I look at misery? Destruction and violence are before me, there is strife, and clamorous discord."

How does God answer Habakkuk? He tells him to watch and be patient, to wait for the vision of God to be realized, to trust God: "The just one, because of his faith, shall live." Faith, in the context of the covenant relationship, means steadfastness, fidelity, and trustworthiness. Stick with me, God tells Habakkuk, and do not give up. In the Gospel we hear the disciples coming to Jesus to ask that he increase their faith. Here is the original Christian community, the small band that Jesus had gathered around himself, coming to him at a time of struggles and uncertainty, to ask Jesus for more faith because they find the going so hard. Jesus answers them: "You are asking for the wrong thing. You do not need more of what you already have. You do not need just a bigger, newer, better product. You need a different kind of faith. If you had the right faith, all you would need would be as much faith as the size of a mustard seed." It is the quality, not the quantity, that matters.

If we had the right kind of faith, as a Christian community, perhaps we could make a difference in solving the problems that surround us. We might be willing to take more risks, to become more involved, and the Lord would work through us to find some answers to the tragic challenges of our world. I believe that Jesus is suggesting to us what the right kind of faith might be. I think Jesus is telling us to do everything in our power, and when we have done everything that is in our power to do, we put it all into the hands of God, because it is only God who can bring forth good fruit, successful ministries, service that makes a difference in the world. We cannot do it ourselves.

There is no prescribed form of prayer for a novena, but many include rosary prayers. Although Novenas can be prayed as a means of mourning the dead or petitioning God's help in a specific situation, we are praying a Novena of Preparation, in anticipation of St. John Henry Newman's feast day on October 9. Therefore beginning on Saturday, October 1, we'll pray a special Novena every evening at 6:00pm, led by one of our clergy or staff. A Little Goes a Long Way

This Week's Readings at Mass


- Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4 Habakkuk's complaint
- 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14 Exhortation to faithfulness
- ► Luke 17:5-10 Sayings on the requirements of faith

Although all three readings today seem only superficially related, each implores the readers to persevere with confidence through times of trial. The prophet Habakkuk cries out to God for deliverance in a time of crisis. God responds, not with an immediate rescue, but with a promise that he will ultimately save "the just one." Likewise, St. Paul encourages Timothy to live from the spirit of power, love, and self-control rather than falling back into cowardice. In the Gospel, Jesus reminds the apostles that even a little faith will suffice to do great things. Taken together, the scriptures for the day offer consolation and strength for everyone struggling with the challenges of daily discipleship in an imperfect world.

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As they travel with Jesus on the road to Jerusalem, the apostles acknowledge to Jesus that they don't think they have enough faith. Instead of berating them for this, Jesus surprises them with the assurance that even a tiny amount of faith is enough to work miracles. If faith the size of a mustard seed is enough to uproot a mulberry tree, Jesus' followers won't have any excuses for why they can't do great things in his name. In the meantime, while they are praying for greater faith, the disciples can do what they can with what they have. With faith the size of a mustard seed a person can plow, tend sheep, or serve at table and all of those actions can give glory to God.

As St. Teresa of Calcutta wrote, we all have "the opportunity to become holy through the works of love that we do because holiness is not the luxury of the few. It is a very simple duty for you, for me—you in your position, in your work, and I and others, each one of us in the work" (*Where There Is Love, There Is God*). How many times do Christians miss opportuni-



ties to serve God because the opportunities seem so trivial or commonplace? Or how many times do we not even attempt to do amazing things because we assume we don't have what it takes to make a difference? Jesus doesn't want excuses for not trying.


The second half of the reading changes the subject to the expectations of faithful disciples. We are called to be like servants, going diligently about our work without the expectation of reward (although Jesus promises a reward in other parts of the Gospels). He wants his disciples' motives to be pure—do the work of God because it is right and good, not because it will profit us personally.
