DEACON'S SPEAKIN'

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

The more we know about Catholic Social teaching, the more equipped we are to express our catholic faith in powerful ways.

What is the Church's official teaching on care for God's Creation? According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, (USCCB) "We show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation. Care for the earth is not just an Earth Day slogan, it is a requirement of our faith. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored."

What Does Scripture say about care of Creation? In Genesis 1:31 we are told "And God saw *everything* that he had made, and behold, it was *very good.*" *Humanity was given a mandate to "Be fertile and multiply, fill the earth and subdue it. Have dominion … over all the living things that crawl on the earth" (Gen 1:28) and … to cultivate and care for it." (Gen 2:15)*

Pope Francis clarified that although Christians have at times incorrectly interpreted the Scriptures, today we must forcefully reject the idea that God gave humanity absolute domination over other creatures (Laudato Si, 67). The Pope reiterates that the texts require humans to cultivate, care, protect and preserve the environment which implies a relationship of mutual responsibility between human beings and nature: "Each community can take from the bounty of the earth whatever it needs for subsistence, but it also has the duty to protect the earth and to ensure its fruitfulness for coming generations." Pope Francis chose as his namesake, St Francis of Assisi who also cared deeply for creation as part of his choice to live an authentic Christianity.

Catholic social teaching associated with care for creation is concerned with a broad range of current events including global warming and climate change. Additionally, as Catholics we are also challenged to be mindful of the ways climate change affects the poorest of the poor, whose ability to survive is based on living off the land, which is most vulnerable to being impacted by global warming.

Whether looking into solar power, eating clean, or taking time to recycle; we encourage you to look for simple ways to care for the environment today as a powerful way to practice your Catholic faith! Another important thing to remember - pray persistently for the success of the efforts of Pope Francis and world leaders as they work to save our planet! Thank you and God bless.

A Special Celebration for our Parish Family!

When I was assigned here and moved in, I met this amazing woman whose faith, zeal for the voiceless, dedication and commitment to the children really raised the bar for my own ministry and faith: Sister Kathleen, SSND.

Sister Kathleen welcomed me, showed me some ropes and put me to work!

Her Religious Order, the School Sisters of Notre Dame is a worldwide religious institute of Roman Catholic sisters founded in Bavaria in 1833 and devoted to primary, secondary, and post-secondary education. Their life in mission centers on prayer, community life and ministry. They serve as teachers, lawyers, accountants, nurses, administrators, therapists, social workers, pastoral ministers, social justice advocates and more.

The School Sisters of Notre Dame are known by the abbreviation "SSND".

Much of their work has been in schools and a wide variety of assignments: spiritual direction, retreats, adult basic education, RCIA programs, pastoral care among Hispanics, in hospitals, and among the disadvantaged, language interpreting, outreach to native Americans and to migrants (also founding an Immigrant and Refugee Women's Program), and on mission to Honduras, Hungary, Sierra Leone, Ghana, and Japan. Empowering underserved women has been a special effort of theirs. Their involvement in migrant services is evidenced in their hosting at the US-Mexican border a conference for Shalom, an international network for justice, peace, and integrity of creation.

More than 3,000 School Sisters of Notre Dame serve in thirty-four countries in Europe, North America, Latin America, Asia, Africa and Oceania.

We have hit the jackpot by having Sister Kathleen with us. Please say a prayer for her and congratulate her on the anniversary of the Foundation of her Religious Congregation, which took place last October 23. *Ad multos annos*! (188 years so far!)

God, Neighbor, and Self

This Week's Readings at Mass


- Deuteronomy 6:2-6 The Great Commandment
- ► Hebrews 7:23-28 Jesus, the eternal high priest
- ► Mark 12:28b-34 The Greatest Commandment

The law that Moses proclaims in the first reading comes in the chapter after the listing of the Ten Commandments; it is sometimes called the *Great Commandment*. "Hear, O Israel: The Lord is our God, the Lord alone. You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your might." This commandment is so central to Jews that it is referred to as the *Shema* prayer. The name is taken from the first word of this verse in Hebrew, meaning "hear" or "Isten." Jesus himself would have recited it many times, beginning in his childhood.

The rabbis, scribes, and Pharisees of Jesus' day were somewhat like police officers, lawyers, and judges today; their professions revolved around teaching, enforcing, interpreting, and debating laws—in their case, the 613 laws in the Old Testament. So when a scribe approached Jesus to ask him which is the first of all the commandments, Jesus didn't have to think twice—of course it would be the *Shema*. The surprise would have been that Jesus immediately added a

second half to this great commandment: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Interestingly, Jesus didn't make up the second law here; he is quoting Leviticus 19:18.

When it came to interpreting laws, Jesus didn't back away from the usual Jewish debates even though he wasn't a part of the religious hierarchy of his day. He knew the laws of the Old Testament just as well as the highest trained authorities. What Jesus was able to do better than most, and what he spent much of his time doing in his teaching, was helping others put the laws in their proper con-




texts. He had no patience for officials who found fault with those who committed minor infractions (such as not washing the outside of a cup correctly). More important to him were the laws that focused on how to love. He was a master at putting the laws together to keep the focus on loving God, self, and others.

Questions of the Week

What does it mean to you to love God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength? How do you try to do that?

For some people, it is easier to love and respect their neighbor than to love and respect themselves. Which do you find easier? Why?

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
